# Standing Buddha 2003.418

Artist/Culture: Unknown Thai/Thai

Date/Period: Late 8th Century

Place: Northeast Region, Thailand

Medium: Bronze

Dimensions:  $58.8 \times 16.5 \times 14.2$  cm

This important Buddha image is shown standing, frontal with both hands performing the Vitarka Mudra, a teaching gesture. The Buddha's robe, worn in the covering mode, is depicted in a highly stylized manner to achieve a pleasing symmetry. The Buddha's hair is arranged in tiers of tight curls that diminish toward the usnisa. The figure has a conjoined tang attached to the bottom of the feet indicating that the image was cast upside down. The tang is the remains of the runner through which the molten metal was poured during the casting process.
