Guides to Research at the Hirsch Library

*Shiva Nataraja* (Indian, Southern Region, 13<sup>th</sup> century) Bronze, 29 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> x 21 x 9 inches (74.3 x 53.3 x 22.9 cm)

Shiva, the god of dance and cosmic movement, is the most dramatic and popular Hindu deity. Shiva dances a cosmic dance (Anandatandava) in which the universe is the light reflected by his limbs as he moves in the orb of the sun. In most sculptures of Shiva this sun is evident, here it is missing. Multiple arms suggest his protection of the worshipper. Shiva holds the fire and drum in his hands which symbolize his dual nature of destruction and creation. Pressed under Shiva's foot is a prostrate demon, representing ignorance.

Before researching a work of art from the MFAH collection, it is helpful to view the work first hand. The information in books and journals will be more meaningful if you have taken advantage of the opportunity to inspect the object itself.

"Reference" books you will find on the library's main floor, and "Ready Reference" books are behind the information desk. Other books can be obtained by asking at the information desk.
